Teaching for the Day

- Worship is the human response to God's greatness and holiness
- We worship God by praying and through service, but especially through the Eucharist.
- We can make each day a gift of love.
- We can unite our prayers, works, joys and sufferings with Jesus' perfect offering.
- Saints have honored God with their lives of praise.
- Identify ways to honor God through lives of praise and loving service.

USE STEWARDSHIP JOURNAL PAGES 2 AND 3

Ask students to choose a favorite saint (see an example of St. Teresa below, for those students who may not be familiar with a saint yet) and read or learn about them using the materials (above). Ask students to identify the way the saint honored God in their life. The teacher may want to model this for the students with their own favorite saint.

Example: (taken from www.americancatholic.org)

Teresa lived in an age of exploration as well as political, social and religious upheaval. It was the 16th century, a time of turmoil and reform. She was born before the Protestant Reformation and died almost 20 years after the closing of the Council of Trent.

The gift of God to Teresa in and through which she became holy and left her mark on the Church and the world is threefold: She was a woman; she was a contemplative; she was an active reformer.

As a woman, Teresa stood on her own two feet, even in the man's world of her time. She was "her own woman," entering the Carmelites despite strong opposition from her father. She is a person wrapped not so much in silence as in mystery. Beautiful, talented, outgoing, adaptable, affectionate, courageous, enthusiastic, she was totally human. Like Jesus, she was a mystery of paradoxes: wise, yet practical; intelligent, yet much in tune with her experience; a mystic, yet an energetic reformer. A holy woman, a womanly woman.

Teresa was a woman "for God," a woman of prayer, discipline and compassion. Her heart belonged to God. Her ongoing conversion was an arduous lifelong struggle, involving ongoing purification and suffering. She was misunderstood, misjudged, opposed in her efforts at reform. Yet she struggled on, courageous and faithful; she struggled with her own mediocrity, her illness, her opposition. And in the midst of



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all this she clung to God in life and in prayer. Her writings on prayer and contemplation are drawn from her experience: powerful, practical and graceful. A woman of prayer; a woman for God.

Teresa was a woman "for others." Though a contemplative, she spent much of her time and energy seeking to reform herself and the Carmelites, to lead them back to the full observance of the primitive Rule. She founded over a half-dozen new monasteries. She traveled, wrote, fought—always to renew, to reform. In her self, in her prayer, in her life, in her efforts to reform, in all the people she touched, she was a woman for others, a woman who inspired and gave life.

Her writings, especially the *Way of Perfection* and *The Interior Castle*, have helped generations of believers.

In 1970, the Church gave her the title she had long held in the popular mind: doctor of the Church. She and St. Catherine of Siena (April 29) were the first women so honored.

Comment:

Ours is a time of turmoil, a time of reform and a time of liberation. Modern women have in Teresa a challenging example. Promoters of renewal, promoters of prayer, all have in Teresa a woman to reckon with, one whom they can admire and imitate.

Ouote:

Teresa knew well the continued presence and value of suffering (physical illness, opposition to reform, difficulties in prayer), but she grew to be able to embrace suffering, even desire it: "Lord, either to suffer or to die." Toward the end of her life she exclaimed: "Oh, my Lord! How true it is that whoever works for you is paid in troubles! And what a precious price to those who love you if we understand its value."

Closing Prayer: Prayer of St. Teresa of Avila

Let nothing disturb you. Let nothing frighten you. All things pass. God does not change. Patience achieves everything. Whoever has God lacks nothing. God alone suffices.

Christ has no body now on earth but yours; no hands but yours; no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes through which the compassion of Christ must look out on the world. Yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good. Yours are the hands with which He is to bless His people.



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Lesson 2: Disciples as Stewards

Teaching for the Day

- God created you, loves you, and gave you special gifts to use to praise and worship him.
- These gifts make you a special and unique disciple of Christ. God asks you to use these gifts to build his Kingdom on Earth. He wants you to use the time, talents, and treasure he has blessed you with to do this.
- As members of the Church, Jesus calls us to be disciples.
 - o That means
 - Disciples make a decision to follow Jesus, no matter what the cost. They have an "attitude of gratitude."
 - Christian disciples experience conversion—life shaping changes of mind and heart—and commit their very selves to the Lord. You shouldn't have to think about being a steward



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- of the Church. Your every thought, word and action to proclaim that.
- Stewardship has the power to shape and mold our understanding of our lives and the way in which we live.
- Use your time, talents, or treasure to show your attitude of gratitude.

Activity

Materials:

• USE STEWARDSHIP JOURNAL PAGES 4 AND 5

Students should identify gifts that God has given them, with which they can help build God's Kingdom. Remind them of last month's session that ended with Teresa of Avila's Prayer, "Christ has no hands but yours."

Share examples of good stewardship:

- A plastic surgeon who makes a handsome income, contributes generously
 to his church, but also spends two weeks a year in a remote village in the
 Caribbean, employing his talent: repairing cleft palates and disfiguring
 burns that have marginalized these unpaying but no less needy "patients."
- A woman who cleans offices in Alaska who contributes her "widow's mite" each week, but also beautifully arranges the altar flowers and lovingly irons the altar cloths used in the liturgies.

Ask students to journal to themselves on the following three questions:

- 1. Where can I help?
- 2. What are the needs here?
- 3. What difference can I—me, specifically me, with what I have to offer—what difference can I make?

Closing Prayer

Oh Great and Awesome God,

Thank you for the example of the widow and her "mites." May she inspire me to give as I am able. Help me, Lord, to know what it means for me to give generously and sacrificially. Amen.



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Lesson 3: Stewards of Creation

Scripture Reading (choose one)

A reading from ...

Genesis 1

- ¹ In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth,
- ² the earth was a formless wasteland, and darkness covered the abyss, while a mighty wind swept over the waters.

Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light.

God saw how good the light was. God then separated the light from the darkness.

² God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." Thus evening came, and morning followed--the first day.

Then God said, "Let there be a dome in the middle of the waters, to separate one body of water from the other." And so it happened:

God made the dome, and it separated the water above the dome from the water below it.

Then God said, "Let the water under the sky be gathered into a single basin, so that the dry land may appear." And so it happened: the water under the sky was gathered into its basin, and the dry land appeared.

God called the dry land "the earth," and the basin of the water he called "the sea." God saw how good it was.

Then God said, "Let the earth bring forth vegetation: every kind of plant that bears seed and every kind of fruit tree on earth that bears fruit with its seed in it." And so it happened:

the earth brought forth every kind of plant that bears seed and every kind of fruit tree on earth that bears fruit with its seed in it. God saw how good it was.

Evening came, and morning followed--the third day.

Then God said: "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky, to separate day from night. Let them mark the fixed times, the days and the years,

and serve as luminaries in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth." And so it happened:

God made the two great lights, the greater one to govern the day, and the lesser one to govern the night; and he made the stars

God set them in the dome of the sky, to shed light upon the earth, to govern the day and the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. God saw how good it was.



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Evening came, and morning followed--the fourth day.

Then God said, "Let the water teem with an abundance of living creatures, and on the earth let birds fly beneath the dome of the sky." And so it happened:

God created the great sea monsters and all kinds of swimming creatures with which the water teems, and all kinds of winged birds. God saw how good it was,

and God blessed them, saying, "Be fertile, multiply, and fill the water of the seas; and let the birds multiply on the earth."

Evening came, and morning followed--the fifth day.

Then God said, "Let the earth bring forth all kinds of living creatures: cattle, creeping things, and wild animals of all kinds." And so it happened: God made all kinds of wild animals, all kinds of cattle, and all kinds of

creeping things of the earth. God saw how good it was.

⁴ Then God said: "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. Let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and the cattle, and over all the wild animals and all the creatures that crawl on the ground." God created man in his image; in the divine image he created him; male and female he created them.

God blessed them, saying: "Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and all the living things that move on the earth."

God also said: "See, I give you every seed-bearing plant all over the earth and every tree that has seed-bearing fruit on it to be your food; and to all the animals of the land, all the birds of the air, and all the living creatures that crawl on the ground, I give all the green plants for food." And so it happened. God looked at everything he had made, and he found it very good. Evening came, and morning followed--the sixth day.

Teaching for the Day

The Bible contains a profound message about the stewardship of material creation: God created the world, but entrusts it to human beings. Caring for and cultivating the world involves the following:

- Joyful appreciation for the God-given beauty and wonder of nature;
- Protection and preservation of the environment, which would be the stewardship of ecological concern;
- Respect for human life—shielding life from threat and assault, doing everything that can be done to enhance this gift and make life flourish; and



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 Development of this world through noble human effort—physical labor, the trades and professions, the arts and sciences. We call such effort "work." Work is a fulfilling human vocation.

The Second Vatican Council points out that, through work, we build up not only our world but also the Kingdom of God, already present among us. Work is a partnership with God—our share in a divine human collaboration in creation. It occupies a central place in our lives as Christian stewards.

- Comprehension through organization of ideas.
 Ask students to help the teacher record the order of creation.
 On the board write each day and its creation event.
- Understanding through prediction and critical/creative thinking.
 At the end of the story, ask students to predict what God did on the 7th Day.
 Most will probably, due to prior knowledge, say "rest". Which is true. The teacher then reveals that a man named Zohar said that the following happened.
 Zohar: "On the 6th day, having created man, God said to him, 'I have worked heretofore, now you shall continue."
 If God told you to continue his creation, made you a steward, or caretaker of creation, what would you do?

How do we make sure that the Earth continues its creation and being?

The teacher may then refer to the coloring pages. The teacher may ask each student to relate each page to a way Earth Day may be celebrated. Examples:

Activity

Materials:

- USE STEWARDSHIP JOURNAL PAGES 6 AND 7
- Creation coloring pages (http://www.coloring.ws/creation.htm), also included this in lesson plan.

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Ask students to come up with one or two ways that they would choose to take God up on his offer to be co-creators. How could each care for one of the days of creation?

Ask students to choose one of the days of creation for which they would like to be a caretaker. Once they have chosen their day of creation, ask the students to read over the Bible verse at the bottom of each page. (http://www.coloring.ws/creation.htm)


Have students free draw one of the days of creation, or color one of the pages provided. The teacher should wander around the room to each student and learn why each student has chosen their particular part of creation. Ask students to write at the top of their paper how they pledge to take care of this part of God's creation.



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

Teaching for the Day

- The mission of the Church is to proclaim the Kingdom of God to the community. Our efforts should be to build the Kingdom of Heaven on Earth.
- Every baptized Catholic is called to do this. This is called our vocation to discipleship.



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- Like Samuel's call, God calls us to play a unique role in the church. "He calls us individually, by name. Each one of us—clergy, religious, lay person; married, single; adult, child—has a personal vocation. God intends each one of us to play a unique role in carrying out the divine plan."
- One of the ways Jesus calls us to do this is through the Beatitudes.

Activity

Materials:

• USE STEWARDSHIP JOURNAL PAGES 8 AND 9.

Discuss with students how when you tell someone that you love them that is a powerful statement. However, to show someone that you love him or her is a far greater act.

Optional: You could use the scene from Princess Bride to illustrate this (if time allows). It is the scene where Wesley always answers Buttercup's requests by saying, "As you wish." And it is revealed that when he was saying that, that he was saying he loved her.

Make a weekly schedule: The Stewardship of Time

Time is a precious gift, and part of the Catholic belief in Stewardship. Everyone is given the same amount of time. Twenty-four hours each day, 168 hours each week, etc... Most of us feel there isn't time to do everything we want to do. So, let's examine how we use God's gift of time.

Distribute a weekly calendar. Ask students to consider how they are using their time. Prompt them with...

- How much time to you give to God (go to class, study the Bible, Catholic beliefs, or pray)?
- How much time do you spend playing, or exercising?
- How much time do you spend watching TV? On the computer/iPad/iPhone/internet?
- How much time do you spend doing volunteer work?
- What do you spend the rest of your time doing?

Closing Prayer

Jesus, help me to spread your fragrance everywhere I go today; Flood my soul with your spirit and life; penetrate and possess my whole being so utterly that all my life may only be a radiance of yours. Shine through me and be so in me that every soul I come in contact with may feel your presence in my soul. Let them look up and see no longer me, but only Jesus! Amen.

- How can our school/parish community work to make their communities stronger sources of faith and service to the larger community;
- How can all Catholics give generous support—time, money, prayers, and personal service according to their circumstances—to parish and diocesan programs?
- How can the universal Church use its gifts to build God's Kingdom on Earth.

Each student will create a diagram of his/her self and indicate how he/she can be a model of the Body of Christ.

They will create a separate diagram of a Church and indicate how the community can work together as stewards.

Closing Prayer

Help us Father to be doers of the word and not hearers only. Help us to live a life that is pleasing to you in what we say, what we do, what we wear, what we think, where we go and how we live. Bring us into alignment with your word and your will for our lives. Help us to be better stewards over our time, over our finances, over our resources, over our destinies, over our families, and over all that you have given us. Help us to be mindful that we are part of the Body of Christ, and that we

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represent you here on Earth. Let the spirit of boldness fall on us today! In the name of Jesus. Amen.

Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

Iohn 8: 3-11

Then the scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery and made her stand in the middle.4They said to him, "Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery.5Now in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women.* So what do you say?" 6They said this to test him, so that they could have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and began to write on the ground with his finger.*7* But when they continued asking him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." 8Again he bent down and wrote on the ground.9And in response, they went away one by one, beginning with the elders. So he was left alone with the woman before him.10Then Jesus straightened up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" 11She replied, "No one, sir." Then Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, [and] from now on do not sin any more."] 2

Teaching for the Day

"In today's society the goodness or evil of an act is often decided according to such popular norms as "If it feels good, do it," "It's all right as long as no one gets hurt," or



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"It's okay if you can get away with it." Such standards—which may subtly influence even the well-formed consciences of adults—can have a deadly influence on children's consciences, which are still in the formative stage. Undesirable norms, therefore, must be attacked head-on with very definite standards for making moral judgments according to the teachings of Christ.

This lesson leads the children to an awareness that people who follow Christ must base their decisions on the standards given to us by God: the commandments, the Beatitudes, and all that Jesus teaches us through the Church. The children should begin to realize that they have a responsibility to form their conscience." (Christ Our Life)

Activity

Materials:

• USE STEWARDSHIP JOURNAL PAGES 12 AND 13.

Help students understand how they can live out each of the Beatitudes. Some examples follow.

Living out the Beatitudes:

The best approach to this topic will be for us to go through each of the beatitudes, one by one, highlighting how people can live the beatitudes. Ask students, using their own time, talent and treasure, to come up with their own ways to live out the Beatitudes

Some of these acts are simple, and some of these acts are grand:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

- Someone prays every day, but always offers prayers for others and not him or herself.
- A person gives up all of his or her free time in order to volunteer.
- A family works to ensure that God is part of their daily lives.

"Blessed are they who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

- The families and friends of the victims of 9-11 are in despair, but the Lord shall provide for them, whether now or in the future.
- A person loses a very close family member. God provides for that person by allowing them to reunite in the hereafter.
- A family is torn apart and a child vanishes. The parents never find the child in this life, but the family is reunited in the next world.



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"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth."

- One individual feeds a homeless individual.
- Groups of people anonymously leave clothing for a clothes drive.
- A person humbles him or herself before God in prayer.

"Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied."

- The Peace Corps sends out groups to provide for a variety of different causes.
- Volunteers peacefully march against an unjust law.
- A student stands up for an individual who is being bullied, teased, and thereby tormented.

"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy."

- Anytime someone truly forgives another, mercy is shown.
- A life is spared at the last minute by a merciful leader.
- A child forgives someone who hurt him or her at school.

"Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God."

- An individual reads the Bible, completely opening his or her heart to the message.
- Children play together at a park with no bias or prejudice of one another.
- A person completes a good act without expecting a reward in return.

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God."

- Leaders of countries work towards and bring about peace.
- Two old friends decide to let go of a grudge.
- Family members who have not spoken in 35 years reunite with each other.

"Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

- Someone is mocked for standing up for an individual that others do not like.
- Christians continue to hold strong in their beliefs, even though they are persecuted.

Closing Prayer

Bless us, O God, with your love and the love of our neighbor. Give us peace of heart, stillness of mind, and the command of our own affections as we strive to live the Beatitudes everyday. We make our prayer through Chris our Lord. Amen

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- Central to our human and Christian vocations, as well as to the unique vocation each one of us receives from God, is that we be good stewards of the gifts we possess. God gives us this divine-human workshop, this world and Church of ours.
- The Spirit shows us the way.
- Stewardship is a part of that journey.

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Spiritual Gift Definitions

Administration

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to organize, administrate, and promote the various affairs of the local church's ministry to direct them effectively. A local church cannot grow beyond a certain point without the ministry of these individuals. See I Corinthians 12:28 Romans 12:8, Titus 1:4-5

Discernment

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to know with without a doubt whether a statement or behavior is of God, Satan, or man. See I Corinthians 12:10, Acts 5:3-6, Acts 16:16-18, I John 4:1

Evangelism

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables particular Christians to share the Gospel to unbelievers and burdens Christians about soul-winning. All Christians are called to witness for Christ whether they have this gift or not. See Ephesians 4:11, Acts 8:5-12, Acts 21:8, Acts 8:26- 40, Matthew 28:18-20

Exhortation

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to deliver challenging and encouraging words. See Romans 12:8, Acts 11:23-24, Acts 14:21-22, Acts 15:32

Faith

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit provides Christians with great confidence to believe and expect great things from God. See I Corinthians 12:9, Romans 5:1, Romans 12:3, Hebrews 11

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Giving

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to accumulate and give large amounts of their finances to the glory of God. See Romans 12:8, Acts 4:32-37, Galatians 4:15, Philippians 4:10-18, II Corinthians 8:1-5

Helps/Serving/Ministering

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit empowers certain Christians to render practical help in both physical and spiritual matters. Serving one another, like evangelism, is a calling of all Christians, but there are some who have a special desire to serve, and receive great blessing from it. See Romans 12:7, I Corinthians 12:28, Galatians 6:1-2

Mercy

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to minister to and have compassion for those who are suffering or afflicted. See Romans 12:8, Luke 10:30-37

Pastor/Teaching

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables certain Christians to preach and teach the Word of God and to take responsibility for the spiritual welfare of a body of believers. See Ephesians 4:11, I Peter 5:1-11

Teaching

This is the spiritual gift where the Spirit enables particular Christians to communicate and clarify the details and truths of God's Word for others to learn. See Romans 12:7, Ephesians 4:11
